St. Patrick's Day is a religious holiday, also known as the Feast of St. Patrick, that has been observed for over one thousand years to commemorate the heritage and culture of Ireland and to remember a christian saint, name Patrick. St. Patrick was born in Britain, but was enslaved in Ireland at the young age of 16. He contributed greatly to converting many druids to Christianity in Ireland. St. Patrick's Day is celebrated on March 17th, the day of his death.

One of the holiday's traditions is a leprechaun mascot, the three-leafed clover (or shamrock) to symbolize the holy Trinity of the christian faith, and wearing green on St. Patrick's day to symbolize the country of Ireland. 1	"WATER-CUP" RELAY RACE	This will be a relay race where the students will be transferring water from cup, to cup, in their Teams line, trying to fill their clear container, quicker than the other two Teams. Each class will be split up into 3	
2	"WET-HEAD" RELAY RACE	During this relay race the students will be split up into 4 equal Teams. The students in each team will take turns running down to their water bucket, fill their cup, and return the cup to the beginning, where they will empty its contents into a container. The Team that has collected the most amount of water in the end, will be the Winners	
3	BALL HOPPER RACE	Each class will be split up into 2 differnet lanes. Each lane will have their own ball hopper. Students will get a chance to take turns and race the other students by sitting on the ball while holding the handle, and bouncing all the way down to a cone and back. No problem if you fall off, just get back on and keep hopping!	
4	Limbo (How low can you go?)	The students will stay in a single file line as they try their best to make it under the limbo pole. When the leader goes under the pole, they will make a loop around and lead their line back to the beginning. Each time the line makes their way back to the beginning the solutioner will lower the pole one spot. See how low you can go without letting your hands touch the ground.	
5	The Statue of Liberty Race	The class will be seperated into 3 different groups. Each group will get in a line. The first person in each line will get ball which is balanced on a tolet plunger. On the start signal, the first person in each team will have to balance the ball on their plunger while running their way down to the end line and back. When they get back they will give the torch to the next person in line. The first team to finish everyone in thier line will be the winning team.	
6	Noodle Bean Bag Relay	The class will be split up into 4 beams. Each beam will line up in a single file line with the line leader holding the noodle with the beambag balanced on top. On the go signal, the player with the noodle will have to make their way down to their teams come, go around their come, and make their way back to the next person in line to pass them the noodle and beambag. If it drops they can pick it up, but they must do 3 jumping lacks first.	
7	Jumbo Egg & Spoon Relay	The class will be golft up into it seams. Each team will line up into a single file line with the leader holding the paddle and wooden egg. On the go signal, that player must quickly make their way down to their once, go around the cone, and make their way back to their film, without dropping the egg. If the egg drops, they must do 3 jumping Jacks before they can pick it back up and balance it again.	
8	TUG O' WAR	The class will be split up into 2 groups with each group on a side of the rope. When the volunteer blows the whistle to begin, pull with all your might. When the volunteer stops the activity with their whistle, please stop pulling the rope and do not let go until you are told to let go. Always listen to the volunteer.	
9	OBSTACLE COURSE	Each class will be split up into 2 different lanes. Each lane will have their own obstacle course to run through. The players on each team will lake turns running through the course. When they reach the end of the course, they will run back to their team by running back along the side of the obstacles. The next student can go when the first student runs back across the line. Only 1 student should be running through the course at a time.





Life In the NBA

Luka Doncic was drafted in the first round (third pick overall) in 2018. He averaged 21.2 points per game. He got the rookie of the year award. He also averaged 7.8 rebounds and 6.0 assists per game.
